### Racism/Hate Experience Project – Kamloops and area

#### A community member has been subjected to racism/hate/discrimination.

I.e. someone has treated them badly, denied them a service or benefit, harassed or insulted them, abused their property, used threats or intimidation, used physical or verbal violence toward them, in a way that targets the person's (real or perceived) race, colour, ancestry, place of origin, culture, etc. This may even represent a hate crime or be grounds for a human rights complaint.

#### What constitutes a Hate Crime?

In Canada, a hate crime is defined as any criminal offense against a person, group or property that is motivated by hatred or prejudice towards an identifiable group.

\*This means that the offensive action must constitute an actual crime to be considered a hate crime.

However, there are criminal code categories for 'hate speech' and 'discriminatory speech'.
